Predictably the ADSS (advanced driving safety skills) event sold out very early, and it is safe to say the 33 students squealed, giggled and smiled all the way home. It's no secret, attending an ADSS event is the most fun a person will ever have in an automobile. Yes - I mean what I said! If you have never attended an ADSS you simply owe it to yourself to get to the next event. If you have attended one in the past I challenge you to find a friend who hasn't, and register for an upcoming one together. It doesn't matter what type of car you drive, what make you drive, or even if you are a BMW CCA member; it only requires is a safe and state inspected vehicle, and a valid driver license for each driver. Our next ADSS event will be held on August 12th. Online registration is fast and easy! Our HPDE students are put into groups based on experience. All groups receive classroom instruction before heading out on the track. Unless you are a highly experienced student who has been signed off to drive solo, just like Bill Auberlen, you will always have your own personal instructor riding with you. We have additional high performance driving schools on the schedule this year and would love to see more first time attendees! Did You Know - ADSS and HPDE events raise money to fund our chapter? They do, in fact, this year the DEC is challenged to raise \$4,000 for the chapter, so by attending a driving event you are actively and financially supporting the club, talk about a win-win.

ADSS, HPDE, + Street Survival The What, the Why and Why YOU Should Participate

DSS, HPDE, Street Survival – what do these events mean to our club? What do the acronyms mean? Why is there a lot of focus and energy in our club devoted to these activities?


To answer these questions, one needs to first understand why they purchased a BMW (MINIs are BMWs). It would be safe to say that most of us purchased our BMW because of the drivability of the car is suited to us. We drive our BMW down the road and the car allows us to enjoy the ride because of its feel and the response that this car gives us to the road. We feel like we are one with the car. I am sure there are more, but this should cover the basic answers.

A few more questions: If you get into trouble on the road because of road conditions (ice or snow) or a pop-up incidence (ladder falling off the truck in front of you) can you avoid serious harm to

you and your passengers? Can you drive the car to its limits in a safe environment? The answers are "yes" or "no", however to get there requires some honesty on your part to face what real driving skill you have. After all, some of us have been driving for decades, so we are going to believe our driving skills are like that of a Formula One champion. Unfortunately, traffic accident statistics bring us to a different conclusion.

Even decades of driving cannot make you a safer driver than one of these schools can.

ADSS, or Advanced Driving Skills School, and HPDE, or High Performance Drivers Education, are the definitions of the two acronyms that I introduced at the start of this article. Street Survival and ADSS are very similar driving schools, with Street Survival being setup for drivers with a learners permit to 21 years of age, and ADSS for drivers with a few years, to decades of experience on the road. The ADSS and Street Survival schools take place in a parking lot where speeds rarely exceed 35 mph, whereas HPDE takes place on a race track and speeds can go beyond 100 mph. All the schools are focused on giving the driver new skill sets, skill sets that make driving safer then at the start of the school. Plus you will have fun mixed in and a new appreciation for the capabilities of your BMW, while being taught in a safe environment.

The ADSS & HPDE schools are not racing schools geared towards making you the next Formula 1 champion. Those are different schools and are taught by racing bodies such as the BMW club racing, Sport Car Club of America (SCCA) racing school and National Auto Sport Association (NASA) racing school. Normally you show up to these schools in a race car, with the race gear associated with racing and lots and lots of HPDE events in your driving profile.

One last thing: A lot of us instructors have been teaching at these schools for decades and we have never seen someone show up with all the skills that are being taught. Even decades of driving cannot make you a safer driver than one of these schools can. Advanced driving skills have to be taught, learnt and practiced. In an environment that is safe, that is what our club's schools accomplish. Students don't just graduate, but they walk away with driving skills that will allow them to survive on the street.

And now you know why it is, that our club focuses a lot of energy on ADSS, HPDE and Street Survival.

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
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Stealth Speakers (part 2) It's Not What You See, It's What You Be

ook around inside your BMW. Where are the bass speakers? You certainly can hear them, but even with a keen eye, you might be hard pressed to find them. Here's a secret... BMW loves to hide the 8 inch bass speakers in current models under the front seats. They are kept out of sight like a troll under the bridge. I guess they are not as sexy as the other speakers mounted prominently in the doors and dashes. The truth is subwoofers do not need to be out in the open since you tend to "feel" the deep lower frequencies as much as you hear them.

Last year I replaced most of my X3 speakers with an upgrade kit. This year I finished the job with two subwoofers. The great thing about the floor mounted bass speakers is that they were actually the easiest set to replace.

Nowadays, seats are simply mounted with four bolts which I was easily able to access in a straightforward manner. No clips, brackets, or wires to disconnect.

Once the seat was unbolted, I simply removed a floor cover to get to speaker housing. (And as a bonus I had a great opportunity to really easily clean under the seats. I found loose change, a dealership pen, and enough snack remnants for a night at the movies). With the existing speakers now completely accessible, removing them was straightforward and simple. In no time at all then, my aftermarket system fit nicely into all existing mountings using all existing plugs.

No, this is not what my speakers sound like. If you ask me, mine sound better.

I installed speakers from BAVSOUND and was very impressed with the quality as well as the customer service I contacted several times with questions. BAVSOUND has a slogan: "With our plug & play BMW Audio Upgrades, driving your BMW will never be the same." How true.

The overall sound is fuller than even the original factory premium Harmon / Kardon system. Other sound system suppliers are out there but you seem to get whatever quality of build and materials (and of course, sound) you are willing to pay for. This BAVSOUND bass certainly fills in the sound spectrum, but it doesn't drown my vehicle's occupants in disco thumping sound à la a Lady Gaga concert. That is a good thing in my experience. To get to that level would require additional big-time speakers and a whole other level of upgrade. But I prefer to keep my sound clean and stealthy, and this under-seat swap really hit the mark.



Speaker access couldn't have been more straight forward. Just four bolts to remove the seat.

From the Far Side of 65 - Not Necessarily MPH X1 meets M235i

recently traded in my '07 Porsche Cayman for a '16 M235i. Nothing but pleasure, never had a problem with the Porsche, but after the Bank of Dad gave the Subaru winter car to our #1 son, I was faced with several realities. If I kept the Cayman, I'd need to buy another winter beater (not a very sound idea since we now spend most of the winter in Florida), or, put the Cayman's depreciating value toward something much more practical, (almost) as much fun, that could, in a pinch, be driven over the shoulders of

winter. Living in an empty-nester house with a two car garage and no basement, I was getting tired of shifting cars back and forth to a remote storage facility as well as the additional costs of rent, insurance, taxes and maintenance.

To be blunt, as much as I enjoyed the Cayman, it was not MBH's plate of schnitzel. While the Cayman was a joy to drive, especially a few times a year at NHMS, it was noisy (but what a lovely flat six bark it had), and a bit of a tight fit, a struggle to ingress and egress for those their 8th decade. Its short wheelbase was not all that compliant on the highway or bumpy roads. I never could convince MHB that we should use it for travel. Once the Subaru was headed to its new home in Georgia, I started ruminating about what to replace the Porsche with. Collectively, we've had 5 BMWs since 1981. Not one was a disappointment (although one dealer back in NJ was). My three 3 Series coupes were enjoyable as daily drivers and fun on the track. I considered buying another BMW, particularly a 2 Coupe that lacked the bulk and plus size of the current 3 and 4 Series. We've also had two Audis that wore well, a TT and an S3, but I was devoid of an emotional response to either. Both seemed nose heavy and overpriced to me.

I need to admit that this unreformed, but well informed, car nut still preferentially reads Road & Track, Car and Driver and Roundel. All three (and the NY Times) praised the M235i when it came out. Thought I'd check one out, so a phone call to Steve Hammond at Tulley BMW, (who shepherded MBH through the purchase of her 2014 X1) set up a test drive. The drive from Hanover to Nashua was worth the trip. Convincing MBH to take a ride south, given her affinity for the Trader Joe's down the street from Tulley, wasn't hard. We both drove an M235i, were impressed and immediately ordered one.

So the 2 Coupe now co-inhabits our garage with MBH's X1. I've managed to record a conversation between the two cars soon after the 2 Coupe arrived. An edited transcript, translated from German follows:

X1: Willkommen, nice to meet you. You have that new car aroma?

M235i: I am just off the boat from Leipzig.

X1: Wunderbar, that's where I'm from too! Born in eastern Deutschland, they call me Angela. I was put together extremely well, not a squeak or loose screw these past two years. No warranty issues either. I suspected a new garage mate was in the works six weeks ago after the Subaru departed. Not a bad machine, but a bit crude with little in common to talk about, especially with that Indiana twang. Another clue I gleaned was that the Old Guy stopped being so fastidious with the Porsche. Even took it to a car wash.

M235i: Never heard about Subie but I did briefly meet the Cayman. We had a conversation outside the showroom while they transferred his license plates to me. He spoke German but with a strange accent. He sounded

pretty pathetic. Hurt. Double crossed. He refused to believe he was now trade bait after eight happy years with the Old Guy. 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








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
